

FY25 ANNUAL REPORT









This Annual Report highlights a year of growth, collaboration, and impact

in advancing early childhood development across the region. Throughout the year, Southeast Childhood Collective strengthened partnerships with families, educators, and community organizations to expand access to quality early learning opportunities and family support services. This report showcases key accomplishments, data-driven outcomes, and stories that reflect the ongoing commitment to ensuring every child in Southeast communities has the foundation to thrive.

FAMILY SUPPORT

The Southeast Childhood Collective connects directly with families through the Parents As Teachers (PAT) program. PAT pairs trained home visitors with parents of children from prenatal through age three, helping to strengthen parenting skills and deepen understanding of early childhood development.

The Juneau PAT program employed 5 full-time and 1 part-time home visitors.

Home visitors completed **1252** personal visits and reached **191** children across **152** families in Juneau and Hoonah.



CHILDCARE SUPPORT

Southeast Childhood Collective works to improve the availability and affordability of child care in Juneau by providing monthly grants to child care businesses, merit-based awards to child care workers, and paid professional development.



In partnership with Tlingit & Haida, Southeast Childhood Collective hosted two CDA courses, supporting **21 individuals** in earning their credentials.

In March, **250 educators** from nine communities attended our annual early learning conference.

With support from the City & Borough of Juneau, we also administered startup and expansion grants to grow local child care capacity.

Additionally, Southeast Childhood Collective celebrated the graduation of the first cohort—four early educators—from its **newly established**, **federally recognized Child Care Apprenticeship Program**.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

Southeast Childhood Collective houses and supports the Partnerships for Families & Children (PFC). PFC is Juneau's early childhood coalition, comprised of 16 non-profit and state agencies working to provide all Juneau families with young children access to community resources that support their health, growth, and development.

Southeast Childhood Collective supports the monthly distribution of the Juneau Parent Bulletin to **2,300** individuals, organizes Family Turf Events, hosts Parenting Classes, manages the partner Diaper Bank, and coordinates Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in Southeast Alaska.



INCREASE IN FAMILIES SERVED

PAT home visitors served 152 families, with an average caseload of 24 families per full time staff. There was a 70% increase in families served per full time staff since FY23.

PAT home visitors served 191 children, with an average caseload of 31 children per full-time staff. There was a 91% increase in children served per full-time staff since FY23.


